Since 1965, Illinois Lions have traveled throughout the state offering FREE vision screenings to the public. In 1983, a Hearing Screening Unit was added to the Mobile Fleet. While the focus in those early years was to screen the eyes for

Glaucoma, the vision screenings done today screen the Retina for damage due to the effects of diabetes and other retinal diseases.

TODAY, the Lions of Illinois Foundation Mobile Screening Unit screens for both vision and hearing loss. It can be seen traveling to various community events throughout the state from March through October.

Vision Screenings

The leading cause of vision loss is brought on by unidentified and untreated diabetic related eye disease, specifically Diabetic Retinopathy and Macular Degeneration. **EARLY DETECTION IS KEY**. SYMPTOMS OF DIABETIC RELATED EYE DISEASE:

- Blurry, Wavy or Double Vision.
- Frequently Changing Vision Sometimes from Day to Day.
- Dark Areas or Vision Loss.
- Pain or Pressure in One or Both Eyes
- Trouble Seeing Colors
- Spots or Dark Strings (also called floaters)
- Flashes of Light
- Difficulty Seeing in the Dark
- Eye Pain or Redness

It is recommended that you see an ophthalmologist or an eye care professional for a yearly eye exam.

Hearing Screenings

DID YOU KNOW? Hearing loss affects approximately 15 million Americans. The Lions of Illinois Foundation's Mobile Screening Unit offers *FREE* hearing screenings to individuals age 10 and older. Some types of hearing loss are preventable by healthy hearing behaviors and awareness of hearing damage risks.

HEARING LOSS FACTS:

- 31.5 Million Americans have hearing loss
- Prevalence of hearing loss increases with age
- ~1.4 Million Children in America also have hearing loss
- -3 in 1,000 Infants are born with severe to profound hearing loss

TYPES OF HEARING LOSS:

Conductive

- Occurs as a result of damage or disease in the outer and/or middle ear
- May be medically treated and resolved

Sensorineural

- Occurs as a result of damage or disease to the inner ear (cochlea)
- Generally cannot be medically resolved; treated with amplification

Conductive

- Fluid
- Foreign Objects
- Allergies
- Ruptured Eardrum
- Impacted Earwax

Mixed

- Genetic Disorders
- Infections
- Head Trauma

Sensorineural

- Aging
- Noise Damage
- Drug Side-Effects
- Auditory Tumors
- Blast/Explosion
